### The Compassionate Heart of God

In Psalm 145:8-9, King David describes the character of God when he says, "The Lord is gracious and full of compassion, slow to anger and great in mercy. The Lord is good to all, and His tender mercies are over all his works." Being a people that are compassionate is essential to being kingdom minded people. A prayer I have heard over the years of being a Christian for those desiring to be in step with God's heart of compassion is: "God, break our hearts, with the things that break your heart."

When we look at the gospels, it is so evident what compelled Jesus to minister the love of God to the people: it was the compassionate heart of God. Without a heart of compassion, we very rarely extend ourselves towards the hurting. In Matthew 9:35-38 we observe the compassion of Jesus towards the multitudes. It starts with the following words, "Jesus **went about** all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues." He went about... We must be like Jesus and **go about** if people are going to be touched by the compassion of God. When Jesus went about, "he preached the gospel of the kingdom, and healed every sickness and every disease among the people." This describes Jesus' Messianic calling.

The passage continues in verse 36, "when **He saw** the multitudes, He was **moved with compassion** for them." "**He saw**" can mean the following: (1) to perceive with the eyes; perceive by any of the senses; (2) to pay attention, to observe; (3) to ascertain what must be done. To see and not act is to just look, glance at without any concern. Jesus saw and responded with compassion to the multitudes. To be moved with compassion means to have the bowels yearn, have sympathy, to pity.

There is no one as compassionate as Jesus. He is a compassionate friend to every hurting person. It was compassion that brought Him from heaven to earth, and from earth to the cross. The Father and the Son saw the misery of man and responded with extravagant, sacrificial love.

In the later part of verse 36 we see what Jesus saw: "they were weary (harassed) and scattered like sheep having no shepherd." They were harassed by the Pharisees who filled them with false traditions and burdens God did not intend for man to carry. The multitudes were destitute of faithful guides to go before them in the things of God.

Jesus next turns to His disciples in verses 37, 38: "The harvest is plentiful,

but the laborers are few. Pray the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into His harvest." Jesus is speaking the same thing to His disciples today (us, His people). Are we listening to His command to pray to the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers in His harvest?

The condition of our times should excite our hearts to pray. When things look bad we should pray more, and complain and fear less. Jesus' counsel in how to pray, knowing that the multitudes are harassed and scattered is: "pray to the Father who is the Lord of the harvest..."

God is the one who sends out the laborers. I hope we hear the call of God to be His sent ones. Only when we are moved with compassion for people around us will we respond to their needs. Please take time to ask God to give you His heart of compassion for people near and far. When He does, respond and help bring the love of God to people. It may be your next door neighbor who is dealing with an illness, a co-worker whose marriage is struggling, or perhaps a homeless person in our town or a refugee who has no place to call home. Let God touch our hearts with His heart.

Session is currently considering several improvements to be made to our building over the next several years. The most pressing of these is re-roofing of the flat roof portion of the building, which is a significant undertaking. However, with the recent fall rains the need for this has become more apparent and we are hoping to have the work completed next summer. We plan to share more information regarding our plans for the building at the time of our annual meeting.

Earlier this year Session used a financial gift from a long-time member to create a trust account specifically for the roof improvements; this fund currently includes ±\$18,000. Based on

an evaluation and estimate we had completed a couple of years ago, we believe that a budget amount of \$48,000 is appropriate for the work. Therefore, we need an additional \$30,000 to begin the work. A portion of the needed amount can come from our major repair budget that we began to set aside from the general fund this year. However, we will need to supplement these sources in order to complete the work this summer.
