I wondered what enduring learning could be accomplished with children so young beyond feeling happy and loved when they come.

The James 1:27 verse came to mind: "Religion that God our Father accepts as pure and faultless is this: to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world." We are collecting offering in Children's Church each Sunday to help the Asante kids, many of whom are orphaned of at least one parent. I thought that praying for the widows was a reasonable project for us."

# **Calvin Community Garden at Ten Years!**

About the time when Calvin Church was discussing a building project that included a sanctuary (and parking) at the north end of the property, Denise Nervik proposed establishing a community garden on that parcel of land instead. About six years later, after the sanctuary idea was no longer being discussed, and the half acre plot continued on as an empty lot, Tyler Jones proposed a garden, and the idea was enthusiastically welcomed!

By June, 2006, the east half of the lot had been rototilled, water lines put in, and willing gardeners found to take plots that were roughly 12' x 35'. The next year or so the west half was also divided up into plots, and a compost pile started growing in the middle.

Tyler moved on to other involvements, a friend of his (a student from another church) managed the garden for a year, then a member of Calvin for two years before I took over in 2011. One of my first projects was to put a drain line in the west side, which typically stayed flooded until June. A couple years later we removed the compost (yard debris) pile and added 11 smaller plots, many as raised beds. The next big project (this month!) is to put in hose hangers

on posts at each pair of plots, so hoses won't be in the paths where people can trip on them.

Reasons for having a plot at Calvin Garden vary. Some just like growing vegetables for their own use or for their church community, and many live where they can't have a garden. Others grow vegetables to give to friends and neighbors and/or the Soup Kitchen.

Calvin Church pays for water, and we ask for a \$25 donation to help pay for the perimeter lawn to be mowed, for the water lines to be maintained, for the yard waste bins, and for loads of compost—which is also paid for by a generous Calvin family.

Calvin Community Garden has become a community in itself, with friendships established, gardeners helping each other, and sharing of seeds, plants, and produce, as well as advice.

Currently there are 57 or so gardeners, either individuals or families. Some are master gardeners, others are first-time gardeners, and there are many levels of experience, seriousness, motivation, and physical ability. There are students, young parents, senior citizens; gardeners from the immediate neighborhood as well as farther away;

five Hispanic and several Asian families; and families from Calvin and several other churches. For some of the gardeners, this is the closest they've come to being involved with a church.

# Missions Partner News Learning About Options PRC

I am so thankful I said "yes" to Judy Kraft when she asked me to go with her in April for an after hours visit to Options Pregnancy Resource Center in Corvallis! In fact, after that visit I am rejoicing that this service is offered in Corvallis and Albany with possible expansion to other neighboring communities.

As a member of the Calvin Pres. Church committee responsible for staying in close touch with the missions we support collectively, I went with Judy. I was hoping to minister to themletting them know of our willingness to pray and continue supporting thembut I know I ended up feeling ministered to, seeing and hearing of the ways the OPRC ministry has touched lives with the gospel message of hope.

The very environment of the OPRC office space shows compassion and comfort for women seeking help because of an unplanned pregnancy. The lighting and decor in the waiting rooms is evidence that the staff and volunteers offer a listening ear, privacy, and unconditional love.

As we were guided from room to room, we heard about the experience a woman would have: pregnancy testing, ultrasounds, referral for prenatal care and resources, living arrangement referrals, and compassionate advocacy and friendship, all without cost. I was impressed by the training and preparation staff and volunteers get in order to engage effectively in those difficult conversations—bringing the hope of the gospel and providing information about a relationship with Jesus.

I was encouraged to hear how members of Calvin can support OPRC – as trained volunteers, or as much needed assistants in fundraising efforts, or simply in administrative assistance tasks, and/or in prayer. Weekly prayer request lists with specific situations that arise daily during the ministry are sent to those who want to ask for God's continued blessing on the work and staff of OPRC and, of course, on the lives of those who choose Options.

Although team members have contributed to the expense of the trip, we will still need to cover food, lodging and transportation while we are there. Her parents managed to raise some of the funds but she is short \$233 to complete the term. If you are able, would you consider contributing to this need?


The Latvian church voted to divide into two groups with different leadership. I don't know much of the details but have learned that I will be able to continue

- Help with set up/clean up for the BBQ on June 24


