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Prayer Makes Us More Like Our Dad

"Prayer is the chief exercise of faith."
John Calvin

I went to college in my hometown, at the school where my dad works as a professor. During junior year, one of my friends, Chris, took dad's class. After a few weeks of the class, Chris told me he was finally starting to understand me. Knowing my dad helped him know me. At the end of the semester, Chris came over to my mom's house for dinner. At the end of the evening he pronounced "Ok Zach. Between knowing your dad and your mom, now I understand you completely."

Chris could say that because I have been so influenced, my character has been so formed, by who my parents are. In ways great and small, I am like them.

The fundamental truth of Christianity is that, by the gracious providence of the Father, by the loving sacrifice of the Son, and by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit, you and I have become children of God. "See what kind of love the Father has given to us, that we should be called the children of God; *and so we are.*" 1 John 3:1

We are God's children. That is our fundamental truth, and that determines our fundamental task: to bear the family name well, to be renewed in the image of God, which was perfectly shown us in His Son Jesus. "Beloved, we are God's children now, and what we will be has not yet appeared; but we know that when He appears we shall be like Him, because we shall see Him as He is." 1 John 3:2

Just as I have been shaped and molded by my human family, all the more am I to be shaped and molded by my heavenly family. We were made in God's image, and sin wrecked that image. But God, in His grace, has brought us into His family that His image, His likeness, might be renewed in us.

How? How is this task fulfilled? How does this likeness come about?

The answer lies in the metaphor. Chris was right-my parents explain me. Their character is my character. Certainly genetics plays a part in that. But a much larger part belongs to sustained intimacy. I am like my parents because I grew up around my parents. We ate meals, went on hikes, read the same books, worked on house projects. My dad and I played a thousand games of basketball together. We went shopping together, traveled together, yelled at each other, hugged each other. We talked all the time, until we were comfortable not talkingsimply being near each other. Six weeks into freshman year my mom showed up in my dorm room to chew me out for not answering calls or emails—no matter what, we were going to communicate.

All that time, all that intimacy, made me who I am. It made me like mom and dad. That's how likeness comes about. When it comes to our heavenly Father, things are the same. The way we spend time with God, the way we laugh and cry, rejoice and rage and lament, talk about everything and nothing with our Father-it's all prayer. Prayer is the only path to sustained intimacy with Dad.

And so, more than anything else, we must learn to pray. We will spend this year doing everything we can to build a culture of prayer, a practice of sustained intimacy with our heavenly family. We will spend this year learning to be children, children of a Perfect Father whom we desperately need to be like.

We are realists about this. It will be a struggle. Sustained intimacy of any sort is difficult. All parents know how much easier it is to feed the kids Mcnuggets than to sit down at dinner with them night in and night out. Every adult child knows it's easier to spend the evening watching a movie than on the phone with their elderly mom.

Praying will be hard. We know this. But praying will be worth it. This is the promise to which we cling, the promise of our trustworthy Lord, that by prayer, by sustained intimacy with our Maker, we all, with unveiled face, beholding the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image, from one degree of glory to the next.

Sunday Evening Gatherings

This month, we are beginning Sunday evening gatherings. These gatherings are intended to build us up as a community, helping us grow as children of God, as brothers and sisters, and as neighbors.

We will rotate through three types of gatherings: Dialogue, Dinner and Prayer, and Missionary Support Group. A brief description of each gathering and a tentative schedule for the fall are below. If you are interested in coming, but would need childcare, please let Sarah or Zach know.

Dialogue: In dialogue we will wrestle together with difficult subjects and questions related to the life of faith (see schedule below for particular topics). As children we get to ask hard questions about the things we struggle with. As brothers and sisters, we don't have to work out the answers alone. Typically, Zach will make a brief presentation on the subject, and the majority of time will be given over to questions and discussion. This is a time to ask the questions that have been bothering you. Dialogue is also a chance to invite a spiritually curious friend, who of course would be free to ask questions themselves.

Dinner and Prayer: On these evenings we will split our time between a simple meal in Olleman Hall and a time of prayer in the sanctuary. This is one of the many initiatives tied to our year of prayer. We are seeking as children to spend time with our Father, to pray for ourselves, our brothers and sisters in Christ, and our neighbors. The prayer time will be structured around either passages of Scripture or particular themes. There is no expectation that everyone will pray aloud in front of folks, so please don't let that fear keep you from participating. The church will provide a simple main course for the dinner. If you are able, bring a dish to share and dinnerware for yourselves. If not, come anyway and enjoy.

Missionary Support Group: If you know God has commanded you to love your neighbor, but struggle to live out that command, this is a gathering for you. On these evenings we gather to encourage one another as neighbors. Some of us need help figuring out what kind of love our neighbors most need. Some of us need courage to show our neighbors the love of God in Jesus Christ, and wisdom to explain that love in a bold, humble, and winsome way. Some of us need help

in praying for our neighbors. Some of us aren't sure who are neighbors are, or to whom God is asking us to be a neighbor. The point is, neighboring is best done amongst brothers and sisters. We will share stories—of successes and struggles. We will pray for one another and for our neighbors.

Our hope in Sunday evening gatherings, as in any time we gather, is to better learn to follow Jesus, our Savior and our Lord.
